## MEMORANDUM

TO:INTERESTED PARTIESRE:TWO-MAN RACE IN IOWA



Public Opinion Strategies conducted an Iowa statewide survey among likely Republican caucus-goers September 5-6, 2023. A total of 400 voters were interviewed on cell and landline phones, and the survey has a margin of error of  $\pm$  4.9 percentage points. The sample was selected from the voter file and stratified by geography, age, gender, and vote history to ensure a representative sample.

## **KEY FINDINGS**

Moving into September, Ron DeSantis and Donald Trump's positives are now identical.
Vivek Ramaswamy's image has taken on water since the first debate.

 This is a two-man race in Iowa. Now that the dust has settled after the first debate, Trump and DeSantis are the only two candidates with significant support – nobody else eclipses 6%.
DeSantis saw a significant increase in his ballot standing since before the debate which has stabilized. Meanwhile, Haley, Ramaswamy, and Scott have seen a decline in support:

Trump's "floor" has gone down over the past few weeks.

Now, just 22% of voters say they are "only considering Trump" compared to 26% after the first presidential debate. Nearly half (48%) of voters say they are "considering Trump and other candidates" and another 29% say they are "not considering Trump."
